## **Kingsmoor Primary School Sporting Achievements in 2022 and running into 2023**

Sport at Kingsmoor continues to be very popular with the children across the school. Since return to school in September 2021, after covid regulations, children have been able to participate in interschool sporting activities (Girls and Boys football, gymnastics, athletics and cross country).

A comprehensive timetable for interschool (Sedgemoor and County) sporting events has been externally compiled for 2022/2023 which has allowed Kingsmoor once again to participate in a variety of sporting challenges with the aim to include all year groups. On 18<sup>th</sup> June 2021, the whole school took part in a Schools Cancer Research Race for Life and we are hoping to once again participate in 2023.

Kingsmoor continues to be dedicated to ensuring that all children are given the opportunities to play sport and represent the school as government guidelines allow.

This year's aim is to widen the opportunities for all school pupils to attend free afterschool sports clubs and the variety of provision which they receive.
